

## **Survey of States Adopting the IBC with or without Modified Accessibility Provisions**

### **Alabama:**

The requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines for Buildings and Facilities supersede the handicapped requirements contained in the Standard Building Code.

The Commission adopts by reference, as official "recommendations" rather than as mandated regulations, Chapter 5 of the Architectural and Transportation Barrier Compliance Board (ATBCB) publication; "Recommendations for Accessibility Standards for Children's Environments."

### **Alaska:**

IBC 2003, but owner is responsible for enforcing chapter 11.

**Massachusetts:**

**CHAPTER 11  
ACCESSIBILITY**

***(780 CMR 11 is Entirely Unique to Massachusetts) 780 CMR 1101.0 M.G.L. c. 22, § 13A provides that all public buildings shall be designed to be accessible to, functional for and safe for the use by physically handicapped persons, in conformance with the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board's Rules and Regulations (521 CMR 1.00)***

***listed in Appendix A and promulgated by the Architectural Access Board, Executive Office of Public Safety. In accordance with M.G.L. c. 143, § 3 and 780 CMR 106.1, said regulations shall be enforced by the municipal building code enforcement official or state inspector, as applicable***
