Code Council seeks subject matter experts/trainers with expertise in PMG field, including pools, spas The Code Council is currently seeking subject matter experts and trainers to share their code knowledge and expertise in the plumbing, mechanical and fuel gas fields (PMG) – specifically for the International Plumbing Code (IPC), the International Mechanical Code (IMC), the International Fuel Gas Code (IFGC), and the International Swimming Pool and Spa Code (ISPSC) – to:

- Develop new technical training content for instruction purposes, including on-site instruction, online webinars and virtual classroom venues.
- Repurpose existing technical content for related training courses.
- Customize and/or integrate state-specific content.
- Provide classroom training or webinar instruction.

The Code Council's aim is to ensure that quality training is available to meet the needs of all members, customers and certification holders. Code of Honor Scholarships application deadline is August 9 for those seeking aid to attend PCH

The application period for Code of Honor Scholarships ends on August 9. It's intended to support participation in the Public Comment Hearings (PCH) held October 23-30, 2019 in Las Vegas and to help ensure that the I-Codes reflect the consensus view of officials at all levels of government by providing funding to Governmental Member Voting Representatives seeking to attend and participate in the PCH. Currently the program includes the following categories:

- Architect Leaders Governmental Member Voting Representatives who are licensed architects (financial support by AIA).
- **Emerging Leaders** Governmental Member Voting Representatives who have served their jurisdiction between 4 and 9 years.
- **Future Leaders** Governmental Member Voting Representatives who are new to the profession, serving less than four years.
- International Leaders Governmental Member Voting Representatives who reside outside of the United States.
- **Match Scholarship** Governmental Member Voting Representatives who have a 50% financial match from their Code Council Chapter, jurisdiction or personal. <u>Click here for ICC Chapters</u>.
- Small Town Leaders Governmental Member Voting Representatives whose city or county population is 50,000 or less.
- Veteran Leaders Governmental Member Voting Representatives who have served their jurisdiction for 10 years or more. Membership in the Legacy organizations will be counted toward years served.

Each Governing Committee has a nominations committee which selects names to be voted upon at the Joint Membership Councils Meeting which will be held on Wednesday morning, October 23, in conjunction with the ICC Annual Conference in Las Vegas. 15th Annual Bob Fowler Motorcycle Ride is the first social event at the 2019 ICC Annual Conference

With start times of 8 a.m. Saturday, October 19, and Sunday, October 20, the 15th Annual Bob Fowler Motorcycle Ride will be the first charitable event held in conjunction with the 2019 ICC Annual Conference in Las Vegas, Nevada. The Ride October 19 will depart The Rio Hotel and travel down the Las Vegas Strip. Riders will experience desert landscapes as they pass through Searchlight, Laughlin, Oatman, Kingman and Boulder City. Stops include Hoover Dam Bridge, Colorado River at Laughlin, Nevada, and Oatman, Arizona. The route is 224 miles or 5.5 hours of riding time before returning under the night lights of the Las Vegas Strip. On October 20, the Ride heads up I-15 to the Valley of Fire State Park and then to Lake Mead National Recreation area and Red Rock Canyon National Park. Deadline is July 15: FEMA requests feedback on building codes for disaster mitigation grants FEMA is requesting comment on its newest grant program -- **Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities** (BRIC). For the first time, through BRIC, FEMA will be able to offer assistance to communities to adopt/update and improve enforcement of up-to-date building codes pre-disaster. ICC-ES issues evaluation reports on using shipping containers for housing to three companies The ICC Evaluation Service (ICC-ES), a member of the International Code Council Family of Companies, issued evaluation reports to three companies offering shipping containers for housing – SG Blocks, Inc. (<u>ESR-3764</u>), Sea Box, Inc. (<u>ESR-4082</u>), and Falcon Structures (<u>ESR-4163</u>). These evaluation reports show compliance to AC 462, the Acceptance Criteria for Structural Building Materials from Shipping Containers, and ensure that these products meet applicable codes and standards. The global container homes market alone, as reported by <u>Allied Market Research</u>, is expected to reach over \$73 billion by 2025. <u>Read more here</u>. ICC-ES also issued <u>ESR-4074</u> to Tesla, Inc. for their Tesla Solar Roof System. This report provides evidence that the Tesla Solar Roof System is in compliance with code requirements of the <u>International Building Code</u> (IBC) and <u>International Residential Code</u> (IRC) and California Building Code (CBC) and California Residential Code (CRC).
