Deadline April 3: Volunteers sought to serve on the ICC Performance Code Consensus Committee

The application deadline is April 3 for manufacturers, builders, code officials, design professionals, government regulators and other industry stakeholders to volunteer for the ICC Performance Code Consensus Committee (ICCP). As an ANSI-accredited standards developing organization, the Code Council is redeveloping the ICCPC through Code Council Consensus Procedures to better reflect issues including climate change, rapid technological change, lack of housing and a need for resiliency. The redevelopment will aim to provide a more holistic approach to dealing with the full lifecycle of buildings, structures and facilities. Once appointed, the ICCPC Consensus Committee will convene to continue to reimagine the ICCPC through the ICC Consensus Procedures. Learn more about [reimagining the ICC Performance Code](#). Changes in the code development process use one combined Online Governmental Consensus Vote

The International Code Council is [revising its rigorous code development process](#) to take effect in 2024-2026 for the development of the 2027 International Codes (I-Codes) and will move the development process to an integrated and continuous three-year cycle. [In the new timeline](#), year one will include two

Committee Action Hearings for Group A Codes, and year two will include two Committee Action Hearings for Group B Codes. Year three will be the joint Public Comment Hearings and Online Governmental Consensus Vote for both Group A and B Codes. The addition of the second Committee Actions Hearings in year one and two will foster more in-depth vetting of code change proposals, allowing an opportunity for committee members to evaluate original proposals and consider submitted responses. This also provides more opportunity for proponents to build consensus for their code change proposal and ensure the best version of their intended improvement to the existing codes. Additionally, with combined Public Comment Hearings in the third year, voting members are able to vote on all suggested changes to the next edition of the I-Codes at one time. The updated process also provides more opportunity for proposed new referenced standards to be developed and finalized on a consistent timeline regardless of the group (Group A or B) with which they are associated. Ad Hoc Committee on Building Safety and Security develops guide on best practices and resources

The International Code Council’s Ad Hoc Committee on Building Safety and Security developed the new “Building Safety and Security Report” for architects, first responders and local and state authorities to provide valuable tools to guide them in keeping occupants of buildings, including schools, safe from intruders and other life-safety hazards in the built environment. Considerations in the report include guidance on how to do a building risk assessment, tips on building safety administration, advice on how to best approach facility hardening, and an overview of tactical considerations such as video surveillance. One-on-one grant application development help from ICC is available as application deadlines near

Code Council members and their jurisdictions throughout the United States have been working on grant applications that are available through federal agencies. Here’s a list of some key application deadlines:

- **March 27 – [Resilient and Efficient Codes Implementation \(RECI\) – DOE](#)** For applicants who have previously submitted concept papers, final grant applications are due in less than 4 weeks. The activities funded under this Funding Opportunity Announcement support a broader government-wide approach to advance building codes and support their successful implementation, the primary focus centers around updating to more efficient building energy codes that save American homes and businesses money, reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and encourage more resilient buildings. *\$225 Million in funding appropriated through Department of Energy for “eligible entities to enable sustained cost-effective implementation of updated building energy codes,”*
- **April 28 – [Safeguarding Tomorrow Revolving Loan Fund](#) – FEMA** - These low-interest loans will allow jurisdictions to reduce vulnerability to natural disasters, foster greater community resilience and reduce disaster suffering. Funds are for adoption and implementation of codes

implementation. *\$500 million over five years. This will last through Fiscal Year 2026. For the first year, FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, is making \$50 million available to eligible entities to establish revolving loan funds.*

- **April 28 – [Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block grant \(EECBG\)](#)** – Pre-Application Information Checklist Due - The Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Program is designed to assist states, local governments and Tribes in implementing strategies to reduce energy use, reduce fossil fuel emissions and improve energy efficiency. EECBG can fund both adoption and implementation of energy codes. *\$430 million in clean energy and energy efficiency funding for eligible entities.*

ICC Evaluation Services updates

ICC-ES issues findings on Pin Foundations Inc.'s Diamond Pier Foundations to secure decks, porches

Pin Foundations Inc.'s [Diamond Pier Foundations](#) have completed the new ICC-ES IRC Equivalency Evaluation Report (EER) for model sizes DP50 and DP75. **The EER is available here: [Link](#)**. The Diamond Pier system consists of a high-strength concrete head with four steel pins driven deep into undisturbed soils. The model sizes DP50 and DP75 were evaluated to the International Residential Code® (IRC) and 2019 California Residential Code (CRC). Diamond Pier Foundations model sizes DP50 and DP75 are intended for use as frost-protected isolated point load footing for simple residential projects like decks, porches, patio structures or other similar types of projects. The DP50-50" model is equivalent to a 20" diameter prescriptive concrete footing, 48" deep. The DP75-63" model is equivalent to a 22" diameter prescriptive concrete footing, 60" deep.
